# Peanut contamination alert

In recent weeks certain shipments of powdered cumin have been found to be contaminated by ground peanut shells. The has led to withdrawal of certain prepared foods with cumin as an ingredient in the USA and the UK due to the allergen risk to consumers, particularly those with aggressive peanut allergies. The write-off of shipments and processed foods has major consequential loss implications. 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#### Case study: Sudan 1 dye claim

A sizable number of food products had to be cleared from supermarket shelves upon notification that the flavours provided contained Sudan I dye. Charles was requested by solicitors acting for the flavourings supplier's insurers to prepare an expert report into these major proceedings. Charles' work resulted in 60% of the claims made the by food manufacturers to recover losses being rejected. The solicitors noted that without Charles' extensive forensic examination, parts of the claim might have gone unchallenged. Charles advised the supplier that there was sufficient evidence to bring a claim against the original supplier of the contaminated materials. Charles prepared a second report and assisted with negotiation of recoveries against the original supplier.
